## YORK BRANCH CLUB REOPENING - 6 AUGUST 2020



Our Branch Club reopened to members only (no guests) on Thursday 6 August, after being closed due to COVID-19 restrictions since Thursday 19 March. Prior to the reopening, a small group of members carried out a thorough clean of the Club premises and set up sanitisers and warning notices in accordance with PHE advice

and directives. To ensure maximum safety, we have had to introduce some basic, but important rules including: signing in and out in the Club lobby, no standing at the bar, no use of the tea/coffee facility and keeping the lounge door open when the building is occupied to ensure increased ventilation to name but a few. Thursday's reopening proved to be very successful, with attendance at the maximum permitted at one stage and several very happy faces to be seen! Our President, Dick Gray, ensured no-one loitered at the bar by taking up a strategic position at the side of the bar to keep an eye on things!



It's early days yet, and it must be stressed that this is a trial reopening. Since reopening however, the Club has been wellpatronised and we have regularly achieved our capacity of 15 persons present at any one time. Should the situation regarding COVID-19 infections deteriorate in York, we will close the Club

immediately until it is safe to reopen. We will also close it if members fail to adhere to the revised regulations, which after all, are based on common sense! Unlike many social gathering places in York, where anyone and everyone can come and go as they please, our Club has a very strict control of entry and is currently open to RAFA York Branch members only. We are not permitting our Club to be used by any other organisation during these restrictions. If you are not a Thursday evening "regular" please contact the Branch Chairman before you intend to visit and book a place. We don't want to turn people away, but we will not compromise on the regulations. We also know that some members may still feel nervous and uncomfortable with any form of social activity and wish to remain shielded to some extent. This is perfectly understandable and no-one needs to attend the Club if they feel this way.

It would be marvellous if we could reopen the Club on Saturdays, but we cannot do so at present due to the social distancing regulations. The number of members who normally attend on a Saturday would currently exceed the maximum permitted under the COVID-19 social distancing rules. However, rest assured that we will reopen when conditions permit, but that will probably not be for some time yet. Personally, I felt very pleased indeed to see old friends again and that, after all, is what so much of RAFA is all about.



## .....AND CLOSING AGAIN!

Due to an increase in COVID-19 virus transmissions and hospital admissions in the UK as a whole during September, the decision was taken to close the Club once more on 23 September 2020. Prior to this, the Club had been open (as a trial only) on Thursday evenings and seemed to be working well. We were open for 7 weeks but the increased threat of a Coronavirus "spike" meant that the safest course of action (given the age of most of our regular attendees) was to close the Club again until further notice. As to when it will reopen? I have no idea whatsoever at the time of writing!



#### A HIDDEN PICTURE WITH A STORY By DICK GRAY

"Operation Varsity (24 March 1945) was a successful airborne forces operation launched by Allied troops that took place toward the end of World War II. Involving more than 16,000 paratroopers and several thousand aircraft, it was the largest airborne operation in history to be conducted on a single day and in one location."

The story of this framed print of Halifax bombers; Horsa and Hamilcar gliders was found unceremoniously gathering cobwebs within the RAFA York branch premises. Although the print depicts one of many such important aspects of the RAF's involvement in the Second World War, the picture in general is sadly of poor quality. I noted on the reverse of the picture frame was the name "Sqn Ldr J R Fisher 31316" plus "2 Years" and "1-5-56" and 'X Scampton'. So, with help from the Internet and the Branch Vice-President John Mawson, I was able to piece together an interesting and worthy story of one of our past branch members and former World War II pilot.

John Ravmond Fisher was born in Kensington, London in 1916 and had an elder sister, their father being a retired international awardwinning clock maker, who was incidentally 69 years old when he fathered John. Educated at Dulwich College. John was a keen member of the OTC (Officer Training Corps). On completing his education. John became a stockbroker (a job he loathed). He joined the Supplementary Reserve of the Royal Tank Corps as a Territorial, and then became a volunteer with the elite Artists Rifles He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Roval Tank Corps on the Supplementary Reserve of Officers in



November 1937 but transferred to the Royal Air Force in the acting rank of Pilot Officer in April 1939.

Owing to his evesight, however, John's initial application for pilot training was turned down, and he was serving as an Equipment Officer at Hartlebury on the outbreak of hostilities. Having then been similarly employed at Waddington and Kettering, he made a second - successful application for pilot training and embarked for Canada in early 1942. On gualifying for his "Wings" in March 1943, he returned to the UK and trained up on the Halifax Mks 1. II and V aircraft with No 1652 HCU (Heavy Conversion Unit) of No4 Group at RAF Marston Moor (Tockwith, near York). Having attended further courses. John was posted operationally to No 298 Squadron at Tarrant Rushton in Dorset in February 1944. There they were to train for towing giant gliders. It was while practising towing gliders that a senior officer suggested that the powerful Merlin engine Halifax would be capable of towing two gliders; John Fisher was selected as the experimental pilot and the system was set-up. The runway in use (more or less into wind) was not extremely long and John Fisher's combination only just made it over the threshold. The senior officer concerned stated that if Fisher makes it, we will send the rest' and he did.

#### SOE supply and agent dropping operations.

Less than a month with 298 Sqn, John transferred with 'C Flt' of 298 Sqn, to form No 644 Squadron, still at Tarrant Rushton, to continue with glider towing duties in preparation for the Normandy landings. In common with 38 and 161 Squadrons, however, 644 was also employed on extensive SOE supply and agent dropping operations. Fisher carrying out around 20 such sorties in the period leading up to December 1944, mainly to circuits in France, but also to Holland and Scandinavia. Shown on the next page are just a few of the well-known SOE code names in his flying logbook that John Fisher took part in:

## **Operation "Overlord" and Operation "Tonga."**

On the night of 5-6 June 1944, Fisher towed a Hamilcar glider carrying troops of the 6<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division to the River Orne area - 'medium quantities of light flak. No damage'. The glider's pilot, Staff Sergeant England, who was severely wounded and awarded the DFM, afterwards wrote to Fisher to thank him for his superb skill in taking them through 'bastard cloud'. On D-Day itself, as part of "Operation Mallard", he towed another Hamilcar, piloted by Staff Sergeant Hill, back to the River Orne area - 'Marvellous trip. No damage'.

# Operation "Market Garden" Arnhem 17 & 18 Sept 1944, & Ernest Hemingway

Ten days later, during a Hamilcar-lift practice flight, Fisher's passengers included Ernest Hemingway, then employed as a U.S. War Correspondent. In September, Fisher completed two trips to Arnhem, the first with a Hamilcar in tow on the 17th, and with 'Mr. Thornton of the BBC.' as a passenger - 'Successful trip. Nearly hit Horsa over LZ'; however, on returning to Arnhem with a Horsa on the 18th, he encountered flak, the first barrage cutting the tow to the Horsa five miles south of the intended LZ - 'Glider appeared O.K. No damage.'

#### Award of the DFC (USA)

From HQ United States Strategic Air Forces in Europe General Order No. 92, dated 14 November 1944: citation read: "For extraordinary achievement while participating in special operations in the Paris area. On one occasion when his airplane was attacked by enemy fighters over the Channel, and his gasoline tank punctured, he evaded the enemy and despite the damage of his airplane successfully completed the mission. His courage and skill reflect highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of his country."

#### Operation "Varsity" 24/25 March 1945

In the closing stages of the war, Fisher was attached to No 190 Squadron at Great Dunmow, a Stirling glider-towing unit, in which capacity he participated in "Operation Varsity" on 24 March 1945, his flying log book noting, 'Horsa 6th Airborne Division dropped over Rhine, Germany. Good successful trip. One hit from flak.' The Horsa's 1st Pilot was Staff Sergeant K. Whitaker, who later wrote to Fisher and his crew to thank them 'for a really first-class trip over the whole of the route. Apart from the landing, which was pretty difficult owing to the smoke and lots of flak, we had quite a reasonable time after we cast off.'

#### SOE and further special operations

Having then flown an SOE trip to Norway - "Flank 2" north of Oslo on the 30th - Fisher was allocated to "Keystone" and "Wimper" operations over Holland on 12 April, carrying 20 containers and 9 paratroops - as it transpired an


unsuccessful trip. However, on 25 April, in his final wartime sortie codenamed "Violet", he successfully dropped Major Pat Worrall of the South Wales Borderers and five other parachutists near Stalag 2A at Altengrabow their mission being to negotiate the safe release of the POWs incarcerated therein. As Worrall later recalled; 'I parachuted down with a radio almost outside the camp gate. I had a letter from Eisenhower, which I presented to the commandant, Colonel Theodore Ochenal. His first remark was; "You British are crazy! Fancy coming here by parachute, risking being shot as a spy, just to save these prisoners a few days hardship." He then took me down to the village pub and we worked out details. I contacted the Ninth Army with my radio.

#### Post-war - Palestine and Mentioned in Despatches.

Fisher, who rejoined No 620 Squadron in July 1945, went on to witness active service in Palestine, the unit's Halifaxes operating out of Aquir in the summer of 1946. He later served in No. 113 Squadron, another Halifax unit based at Aquir, his flying logbook revealing several parachute drops. He was mentioned in despatches "For distinguished services in Palestine." (London Gazette 29 June 1948).

In 1946 John became a member of RAFA upon its creation from the dying embers of World War II and he subsequently became a Life-Member. In early 1947, John was grounded for employment as an Administrative Officer, but he witnessed further active service in the Arabian Peninsula in the late 1950s. It was during the 50's that he took up gliding through the BGA (British Gliding Association). In 1957 he moved to Husthwaite, near Easingwold, North Yorkshire, where his first wife, Nadine Radford, who had property in the area.

He was placed on the Retired List as a Squadron Leader in September 1966. It is probable that RAF Scampton (as stated on the back of the picture) was one of the stations that John was based at prior to transferring to Civvy Street. He went on to manage the Barclays Bank branch in Clifton, York. It was around this time that John transferred his RAFA membership to the York Branch and became an active member and attended many functions. As can been seen in the attached photo, John sported a handlebar moustache and was a member of the York branch "Handle-bar club". The photo on page 15 shows John Fisher (far right) in our York RAFA Club in Aldwark, entertaining the comedy actor Jimmy Edwards DFC, who popped into the club while on stage in York. Jimmy himself was a pilot himself with 271 Sqn, flying the C47 Dakota and was himself shot down by a Fw190 on 21 Sep 44 over Arnhem, while dropping supplies to British paras below. Jim suffered facial burns and became a member of the "Guinea Pig Club", hence Jim grew a handle-bar moustache to hide the scarring.



For Squadron Leader Fisher, flying remained high on his list of preferred activities, and would visit Sutton Bank gliding club in the early 80's as John Mawson recalls; he would meet up with John on Wednesdays for a day's gliding. Afterwards they would visit the Fauconberg Arms at Coxwold with their respective wives. John and Nadine later separated around 1982. John was to later meet Joan Audrey Harrison-Broadley whom he wooed with the gift of a little St Kilda's ram, black with four horns and earning the name "Diablo". The couple married in 1986 and bred Hebridean sheep, winning prizes at local shows.

A spirited, sometimes unconventional man, who was willing to bend rules which he judged to be stupid, he did believe in getting things done – and done properly. He could be relied upon to help out, as he did on his 70th birthday when he picked potatoes for a friend who was short-handed – his birthday cake being brought out to him in the field. He enjoyed life right to the end, making his last flight at the age of 94 with his friend and owner of Baxby airfield, Dave Smith. So, a fitting tribute to one of our gallant heroes of World War II that has presented this picture with a new meaning.

Sqn Ldr John Raymond Fisher died at Thirsk in May 2012, aged 95 years. His funeral service was held on 8 May 2012 at St Nicholas Church, Husthwaite. John Fisher is survived by wife Audrey, his daughter Melanie and great-grandson Edd. John Mawson attended his funeral and wake in the nearby village pub.

On 25 March 2015, at an auction held in Hull, Sqn Ldr Fisher's medals, along with an extensive archive and related memorabilia (one of these items was his identity discs with 'St. Christopher' lucky charm) was sold to a private bidder for £2,800. It was noted the Yorkshire Air Museum were interested in acquiring the lot but were unable to then raise sufficient funding. The list of Sqn Ldr Fisher's medals is as follows: 1939-45 Star, Air Crew Europe Star with France & Germany Clasp, Defence Medal, War Medal, Mentioned in Despatches Oak Leaf, General Service Medal (1918-1962) with 2 clasps: Palestine 1945-48, Arabian Peninsula; 1953 Coronation Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross (USA), Arnhem and Normandy anniversary commemorative medals.

## VJ DAY 75TH ANNIVERSARY CEREMONY

On Saturday 15 August, memorial services were held in many parts of the World to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of VJ Day. Given the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, such ceremonies were, by necessity, rather restricted, but were held nevertheless. York was no exception and a small civic ceremony was held at the Kohima Memorial in the York Minster Gardens on the morning of the Anniversary. The service, led by Canon Michael Smith, began with an act of Remembrance, the marking of the National two-minute silence held at 1100. The Service was scheduled to be held in the Minster but this was changed to the Minster Gardens due to social distancing restrictions inside. The Kohima Memorial was, however, a very fitting location for the Service.

#### BATTLE OF BRITAIN EIGHTIETH ANNIVERSARY SERVICE AT YORK MINSTER

On Tuesday 15 September 2020, a small Service of Remembrance was held by the Astronomical Clock in York Minster at 1230 hours. COVID-19 restrictions meant that the usual Battle of Britain anniversary service and Turning of the Page ceremony could not be held in their usual format. Instead, a much smaller event was organised by our York Branch Chairman, Sqn Ldr Brian Mennell RAVFVR (T) (Retd), who also acted as the event controller. The Reverend Canon Dr Vicky Johnson (Minster Precentor) opened and closed the service with prayers.



The two Book of Remembrance page turners were Sqn Ldr Andy Bryne RAF (Retd), RAFA York Branch Secretary and Sqn Ldr John Lecornu RAF, Officer Commanding, Yorkshire Universities Air Squadron.
